The Arab Land Initiative

The Arab Land Initiative was established in 2016 to address some of the key land governance challenges faced by the Arab states by increasing coordination, collaboration, knowledge and information sharing among organizations and institutions that are active in the region. One of the main achievements of the Initiative of 2018 has been the organization of the first Arab Land Conference, hosted in the Emirate of Dubai, UAE on the 26-28 February 2018. During the event, the Dubai Declaration on Land Governance in the Arab States was adopted, paving the road for future collaborative action on land governance and land administration in the region.

The Context

The Arab region is facing complex challenges in a rapidly changing environment. These challenges include rapid urbanization, climate change, and desertification in contexts of violent conflict and social unrest. Most of these challenges have an important land dimension: unequal access to land – especially for women and youth –insecurity of tenure in zones of migration and return unsustainable land use; limited capacities of land administration and weak institutions for dispute and conflict resolution are some of the land-related factors, which structure these challenges. Land-related challenges in the Arab region are not substantially different from those encountered in other parts of the world. However, certain common land-related patterns emerge in this region as elements that shape the way people can access to, use of and control over land, and which therefore require special attention.

The Focus on Capacity Development

Capacity development is a pillar of the Arab Land Initiative. Building on the existing expertise of land professionals, practitioners, academics, and other stakeholders involved in different aspects of land governance in the region, and capitalizing on the presence and work of different relevant networks – such as GLTN, NELGA, ILC, Housing and Land Rights Network, AUS, etc. NELGA has conducted this capacity development assessment of land governance in the countries of North Africa (NA).

The capacity development component of the Arab Land Initiative comprises of a series of interconnected activities that include:

- Undertaking a capacity needs assessment of land governance in Middle East (ME) & Gulf Regions;
- Reviewing the land governance curricula in the region;
- Mapping land-governance related courses and institutions in the regions.

The objective of the capacity assessment is to summarize the status of different aspects of land management and land administration in the Arab region, giving an accurate indication of the capacities of the countries to deliver good land governance through the joint action of the different land institutions and stakeholders. And the objective of the mapping of existing learning offers is to identify the gaps and opportunities for short courses related to land governance on country level in the region.

Mapping Existing Learning Offer & Related Curricula on Land Governance

According to the agreement of cooperation, this component focuses on the mapping of existing educational and training institutions in Arab States that offer learning curriculums related to land governance and review the curricula used. All countries in North Africa, Middle East & Gulf will be assessed and, whenever possible, the mapping will be undertaken at the same time than the capacity assessment.

Building on the networks and connections of UTI and partners, a mapping of the regional and national organizations that offer trainings and learning on the different aspects of land governance will be done. This will include technical schools, universities, public and private organizations offering training and

other short courses, government departments, etc. in each country. For each institution / organization, a list of courses will be provided and the curricula used will be described in detail.

Objectives of the workshop

- Discuss the work done regarding the capacity assessment: outcomes, lessons and way forward;
- Present the work done and the analysis of the learning offer: outcomes, lessons and way forward;
- Discuss the gaps in the land curricula at national, sub regional and regional levels and recommendations on how to fill the gaps identified;
- Discuss how existing land networks can support the way forward;

Expected Outcomes

- Common understanding on the available curricula on land governance and of the capacities in the Arab region (national, sub-regional and regional levels);
- Common understanding on the key elements of a curriculum on land governance;
- Clear roadmap on how to finalize the capacities' assessment reports and the analysis / report of the learning offer assessment;
- Specific list of next steps for UTI and GLTN

Methodology and Structure

The meeting will have open and structured discussions among the participants and it will include plenary sessions, presentations, panel discussions and small group exercises and discussions. The overall facilitation will be handled by GLTN and UTI, while other participants might be asked to facilitate small group discussions.

Participants

The meeting will be attended by approximately **25** key experts from GLTN, UN-Habitat, Arab Land Initiative Partners, Reference Group members and Implementing Partners. A full list of participants and contacts will be provided at the event.

Logistical Arrangements

The meeting will take place from the **02nd-04th of November 2021** at **UTI premises in Cairo, Egypt**. The participants are expected to make their own visa arrangements as needed, while UTI will be in touch with participants about other logistical arrangements; regarding the travel and accommodation that will be provided on a separate note about logistics.
